



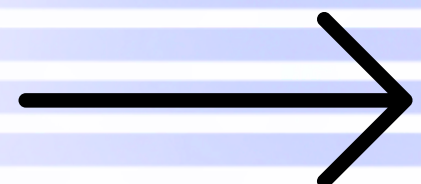

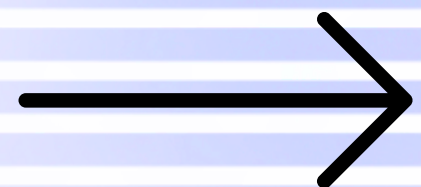
INC-5.2, scheduled for August 5th-14th, 2025, in Geneva, Switzerland, presents a critical opportunity for African countries to continue showing leadership and ensure the treaty delivers on ambition, equity, and enforceability.



African nations are primarily importers of plastic products and waste and thus suffer disproportionately from the health, climate, environmental, and social impacts of plastic pollution. →



The civil society organizations in Kenya are calling for a unified African voice to demand a strong, legally binding treaty that reduces primary plastic polymer production and eliminates hazardous chemicals throughout the plastics lifecycle





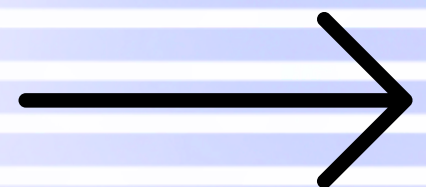

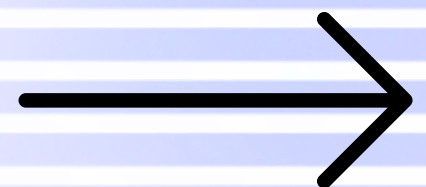
